A LETTER FROM OUR BOARD

2019 has been an incredible year for ONETrack International. We have continued to expand and see major growth in a variety of areasstrengthening our procedures, establishing new areas of operations, and solidifying our evaluation process and criteria. With the addition of our new Cambodia project, we now serve 998 amount of people around the world, including both the children in our programs as well as their host families.

This escalation in development is a true testament to the commitment and compassion of our team and partner organizations, our financial supporters, our volunteers and our staff. International endeavors that affect the lives of children are never easy. We've had to adjust our processes in **Cameroon**, where the communities that we work in have experienced some of the violence from the ongoing Anglophone Crisis; and in **Honduras**, where we continue to take on the hardships that have caused countless families to uproot and head toward the US in search of better opportunities.

"The ONETrack Team has been watching the Global Orphan Crisis for many years- initially through the lenses of our original projects in Cameroon; and early on, we recognized that things needed to be done differently." A large part of our job is making hard decisions and this involves maintaining strong relationships in the villages that we support so we can restructure when necessary and we are proud to have some of the most amazing people working with us across the globe. We've also had to ask more from our supporters than ever before; but, the results of all our efforts are undeniable as more communities adopt our **Transition to Home** approach and embrace the benefits that come with being able to have children raised among their families and receive the education that they certainly would not have had without our support. Thank you to you all for such dedication to our cause.

The question is, where do we go from here?

Our team has spent the better part of 2019 laying out a new strategic plan in order to answer that question, and it involves not just addressing the root causes of the need for better orphan-care, but also in determining how we can do our part as a force for change in the overall response to the threats from the **Global Orphan Crisis**- and how we can better assist in the transformation of the collective attitudes and perception of how the situations of parentless children should be managed.

News From The Board!

The ONETrack International Board of Directors is honored to announce that starting in 2020 we will begin working with at-risk children in Kosovo. ONETrack will be providing social services to meet the rights of vulnerable Kosovar children in need of social protection. Stay tuned in 2020 to find out more about our latest partnership and how you can start reimagining orphan care for the children of Kosovo.

And, we are proud to be at the forefront of this conversation!! As a global child advocacy group, we are cultivating new methods all the time and tailoring our reintegration tactics to each region independently with concern for culture and historical context. We will always focus our efforts on the **most vulnerable children**, but new strategies will include preventative orphan-care and other fresh approaches. Last year we provided an average of 60,225 combined days of orphan assistance in six counties. That's a good benchmark, but it's not enough and we have a long road ahead of us.

Our commitment to our students demands that we serve all children and families according to their needs, no matter where they are or what specific issues are unique to them. This means that we are determined to never 'blanket support' a community in a one-size-fits-all model; but rather, implementing precision-style assistance that involves working for the villages that we serve to find solutions and follow their lead in what they perceive as best practices.

This is a very healthy way of accomplishing our goals and one that has distinguished our vision and methodology, and one in which we believe is how those who share our passion for seeing every child on earth educated and nourished should be striving to adopt.

We know that vision is attainable — if we work together. We cannot thank all of you that are backing these efforts in whichever capacity you have been supporting us enough. Thanks again for everything.



ONETrack International is one of only a handful of NGOs selected to participate in an advisory committee currently working out of Auburn University and Fort Benning and consisting of high level officers, members of academia, and non-governmental

Our committee exists under the Military Advisor Training Academy and is charged with looking at how the military can adopt better practices during humanitarian interventions and non-combatant environments-developing the necessary training for advisors from all US service branches and NATO allies, and finding solutions to how NGOs and the armed forces can better coordinate in areas of shared space.

Children Away From Home

For most Honduran parents, there was no other option. The economic situation in Honduras was not stable enough for them to find work to support their families. Their children faced a future of suffering, violence and extreme poverty. The Migrant Caravan that started in San Pedro Sula, Honduras in October of 2018 consisted of over 1,000 immigrants looking to take their chance on a journey north. Many parents saw this as the only opportunity for their child to receive an education, safety and a chance at life.

To this day, thousands of Central Americans are continuing to leave their homes, fleeing both economic hardships and gang violence, and making their way hundreds of miles to the US-Mexico border. The Caravans were intended to protect migrants from the abuses and exorbitant fees of smugglers and 'coyotes', as well as shield the most vulnerable from the dangers that left women and children susceptible to gender abuse and exploitation. There was 'safety in numbers' or so was the thought; however, within the sea of anonymity, unaccompanied minors were at risk of other threats. When migrants weren't allowed to cross into the United States, they began gathering in increasing numbers at various border crossings and the children were exposed to the violence that intensified between members of the Caravan and border patrol and local communities. In addition, new deals between the US and Mexican and Central American governments to curb migration have prevented many of the newest Caravans from reaching the border at all and this has left unaccompanied minors scattered throughout the region and left to fend for themselves. Besides being alone and scared, children are unprotected and subjected to many perils-including sexual exploitation and human trafficking.

ONETrack International was among the first to respond to the needs of children within Honduras who, without alternative options, were liable to make an attempt for the border. We recognized the need to address the underlying issues that were forcing the caretakers of orphaned children to send those in their care alone on such a dangerous journey, and we intervened at this juncture. If things like security, food, education and health (and, as they get older, opportunity) were made available, many would reason that the journey would not be worth the risk.





Why School Is More Than Just An Education

Working with our local partners, ONETrack in Honduras provides social support by helping to deliver the basic needs often inaccessible to the most impoverished of Honduran society. Most of the children have experienced traumatic physical or sexual abuse, neglect, or were simply abandoned prior to being welcomed into our care, but with ONETrack International and our friends at Helping Honduras Kids, these children have new prospects for a better life. Now, the children in our program are raised with their peers and are experiencing family life despite having been orphaned or abandoned; and, all are currently enrolled at The Jungle School, an institution administered by our partners for over 200 students and situated in the dense forests outside the city, where they receive quality educations, supplies, hygiene kits, vitamins and check-ups. And by increasing school attendance, providing access to basic health care, hosting children's activities, promoting girl's health, preventing genderbased violence and other imperative services, our children will grow to be happy, healthy and productive adults.



Since 2016, the Anglophone Crisis in Cameroon has threatened the regions. The United Nations estimates over 714,100 people are fight for control. In the most hostile regions, 40 percent of health care centers have been closed. As a result, vaccination and primary care services have been disrupted, placing children at higher risk.


Significantly, insecurity and poor road access have limited humanitarian organizations' ability to provide aid to the Anglophone regions. Although 1.9 million people - half of whom are children - are estimated to be in need of assistance, about 65 percent of the affected areas are unreachable by aid workers. Therefore, partnering with locals is crucial to helping communities caught in this

Thanks to our partners, the ONETrack ambulance communities with critical healthcare needs to travel to the regional hospital for lifesaving care and reach victims who may otherwise have not received aid or had the ability to travel to a healthcare facility.

When her father passed away in sixth grade, she was left with few options. But chance intervened and led Hannah to a new chapter where she found the Chiedza Learning Centre and greater opportunities thanks to the support of generous supporters.

Hannah grew up like most children in Zimbabwe; an economic orphan with a single mother and lack of stable income. Her father died when she was in sixth grade and her mother turned to her for help with her siblings. Growing up as a Zimbabwean girl, her choices weren't easy, but that didn't dnt stop her from choosing the hardest one: to become a college graduate.

Hannah was introduced to the Chiezda Learning Centre by a friend down the street. Her mother could not afford formal school fees, so her only option was to attend

Chiezda's free learning programs where she could learn enough to pass exams to qualify her for formal education scholarships. She now joyously sits at a formal Zimbabwe secondary school where she is working towards her realize my dreams. I thought I lost all hope because I thought I was not going to go to school and fulfill my graduation certificate.






INDIRECT IMPACTS








AN OVERALL LOOK
